Why dump waste at a sanitary dump site location? By using these disposal stations, the sanitary waste will be treated and disposed of properly, instead of ending up in storm sewers, which often discharge straight to streams, rivers, and lakes.

Dumping Waste into Storm Drains or in Ditches Causes:

- Decreased *fish* and other aquatic life habitat.
- Increased cases of Swimmer's Itch and other harmful health effects.
- Increased chance of contaminated drinking water supplies.
- Increased *alerts* on the dangers of eating fish.
- Increased drinking water treatment costs.
- Increased amounts of beach closures due to bacteria.
- Increased foul odors.
- Increased algae blooms causing fish kills.
