Settlement Preference Trends

- Since 1960 County population ↑ over 50%
- Large statistical difference between the growth of townships versus cities & villages
 - From 1960-2000 township pop. increase averaged 86%
 - During the same time the village average increase was 50%
 - Cities average decrease -10%

An Aging Population Trends

Projections for the County from 2000-2025 estimate the following changes

> 0-15 yr cohort	↑ 3%
> 16-24 yr cohort	↓ 6%
> 25-34 yr cohort	↑ 9%
> 35-54 yr cohort	↓ 9%
> 55-64 yr cohort	↑ 49%
> 65-74 yr cohort	↑ 92%
> 75 and older	↑ 47%

Race Population Summary

Van Buren County's minority population according to the 2000 Census

- Percentage of total population identified as "minority" is 15.5%
- Percentage of the total population identified as African American is approximately 5%.
- Percentage of the total population identified as Hispanic is approximately 7%.



Population Summary The gender distribution across the total County population is almost exactly 50-50.

Individuals with Disabilities Population Summary

Approximately 22% of County residents claim to have a disability (15,116 individuals age 5 or over).

- This percentage is roughly the same as found throughout the southwest Michigan region
- In the age 5-15 year cohort the vast majority are mental disabilities (about 7:1)
- In the age 16-64 year cohort the majority are physical disabilities

Education Degree Attainment

County population 18-34 enrolled in college or graduate school is 11%

- Percent not enrolled but with a bachelor's degree or higher is 8%
 - These numbers are lower than each of the other two counties in the southwest region.

 And significantly lower than those Statewide.
 > 79% of residents over 25 have received at least a high school diploma.



Comparing 2000 data to 1990 data, there has been an increase in the overall percentage of the population with a higher level of education



Education

Upper Level Facilities

- The institute of higher learning located in Van Buren County is a branch campus of Lake Michigan College in South Haven.
- The four year colleges and universities serving the County are:
 - Western Michigan University
 - Kalamazoo College in Kalamazoo County
 - Andrews University in Berrien County

<u>Migration</u> Regional Summary

The SOUTHWEST REGION has grappled with outmigration and particularly between 1980-1990.

Migration is often measured against the natural population increase.

During that decade, the REGION lost more through migration than it gained through natural increase

<u>Migration</u>

County Trends

- During the last three Census decades, VAN BUREN COUNTY has had only one period where there outmigration outpaced inmigration (1980-1990).
- During that same three decade Census period BERRIEN COUNTY had three successive periods where outmigration outpaced inmigration
 - And even one period where outmigration outpaced the natural population increase (1980-1990).

<u>Household Types</u>

Married vs. Single Head of Household

- Married Couple households represented approximately:
 - 84% of total family households in 1980
 - 60% in 1990
 - and 57% in 2000
- A male head of household scenario represented approximately:
 - 3% of total family households in 1980
 - 5% in 1990
 - and 7% in 2000

Household Types Married vs. Single Head of Household (cont.) > A female head of household scenario represented approximately: 13% of total family households in 1980 15% in 1990 and 15% in 2000 Non family households represented: 26% of total households in Van Buren County in 1980 25% in 1990 and 27% in 2000

<u>Housing</u>

Age of Housing Stock

- The median year for home construction was 1971
- > The median year for rental units was 1966
- Conclusion: the current housing stock is quite old

Housing Affordability

Median house value \$94,200

- * "Affordable Housing" price = \$98,412 or less \$39,365 (County Median income) X 2.5 = \$98,412
 Median Monthly rent \$451
- Work hours per week to afford a two-bedroom rental (@ minimum wage \$5.15)=91 hours
- Estimated percent of renters unable to afford two bedroom rental = 46%

Employment Location & Type

10 largest private employers are either in the Mattawan/Paw Paw area (east side of the County) OR in the South Haven/Covert area (west side of the County)

- Manufacturing sectors (durable & non-durable goods) were 26% of employment
- Retail trade 17%
- Educational Services 9%
- Health Services 8%
- Agriculture, Forestry, Fisheries 6%

<u>Employment</u> **Unemployment & Wage** Unemployment rate 6.7% in 2006 • 6.9% in Michigan for 2006 > Wages tend to be low as demonstrated by median household incomes and poverty levels cited in public schools.

<u>Income</u>

Median Household Income

- County median household income \$39,365
- Median household income is highest in Antwerp Township (east side of County near Kalamazoo) at \$57,014
- Lowest in Hartford Township (west side of County) at \$20,076

<u>Income</u>

Low Income Communities

Determined by the percent of residents reporting an income of 80% or less of the County's median income.

In Berrien and Cass Counties there are five communities in the low and moderate income bracket

Another Measure of Economic Disadvantage

In six of Van Buren County's eleven public school districts over half of the students are identified as "economically disadvantaged"

- Covert Public Schools has the highest percentage of economically disadvantaged students at 89%
- Mattawan Consolidated Schools has the lowest at 13%

Agriculture Income

- \$68 Million from crops
- \$17 Million from livestock
- > \$85 Million in total farm gate receipts
- > 50% of primary County industry is from agriculture & food processing
- > 34% of all County employment is derived from agriculture

Agricultural Rankings

Michigan Rank of Van Buren Agricultural Commodities:

- > 1st in production of blueberries
- > 2nd in number of acres of fruit and fruit farms
- > 3rd in asparagus production
- > 4th in vegetable production
- > 6th in number of hogs
- > 10th in number of farms
