Foerster and Payne Honored with the Welch-Lackey Leadership Award

At the January 31, 2012 meeting of the Southwest Michigan Planning Commission (SWMPC), held at Southwestern Michigan College, Chair Linda Preston honored Dave Foerster and Gloria Payne with the Welch-Lackey Leadership Award.



V.B. Co. La SWMPC Executive Director, commended the recipients; "for your years of committed service to the SWMPC and dedication to intergovernmental cooperation across southwest Michigan."

Devel Egelhaaf noted Foerster's position as SWMPC Van Buren County Citizen Representative since 2008 and work on the SWMPC Financial Management Policies & Procedures Committee in 2008. Also mentioned was his continuing involvement in many organizations that support the goals of SWMPC.

Lake Township Clerk Payne was recognized as the SWMPC Berrien County Townships Representative since 2001. Egelhaaf especially commended her as catalyst in the health care overhaul at the SWMPC that has saved the Commission \$40,000. Later in the meeting, Payne was chosen as Vice Chair for 2012 during the annual election of SWMPC officers.

The Welch-Lackey Leadership Award is presented annually in honor of former Commissioners George A. Welch and William F. Lackey. These men served the Commission in times of great personal difficulties, yet continued throughout to represent the spirit of public service

and to further the goals of intergovernmental cooperation. Their contribution to the communities they served embodies the leadership qualities essential to the preservation of our citizen form of government. Board members vote by secret ballot from nominees submitted by the SWMPC staff as members currently exemplifying such qualities.

Low Impact Development Workshop

Builders, planners, local government officials, and the public attended the Low Impact Development Workshop on March 1 in Sawyer, MI. The workshop presented a shift in thinking about water as a resource while planning and designing for new development or re-development.

Engineers and practitioners discussed how to utilize natural systems to treat polluted runoff and protect rivers, streams and lakes. Traditionally, water is collected and transported off the building site as quickly as possible. This has resulted in polluted streams and lakes and sometimes increased flooding.

The focus is now to slow the water down, spread it out, and soak it in recharging groundwater supplies. The attendees discovered cutting-edge techniques, received resources, and heard about local examples. These techniques can often save on long-term costs, while also protecting water resources.

Scott Dierks from Cardno JFNew spoke about the basics and benefits of low impact development (LID) and incorporating it into new developments and redevelopments. Mark Parrish from the Pokagon Band of Potawatomi spoke about why and how they used LID in their Tribal Housing development located in Dowagiac, Michigan. Matt Davis, an engineer from Wightman & Associates, presented on design considerations when using LID techniques. Marcy Colclough a senior planner from SWMPC spoke about how cities, townships, and villages need to update ordinances because many are barriers to implementing LID. An easy area for improvement is to focus on parking requirements.

The Village of Three Oaks won a \$600 gift certificate from the Cardno JFNew Native Plant Nursery to install a rain garden on public property. They were the municipality within the Galien River Watershed with the most staff and elected and appointed officials that attended the workshop.

Landscaping and Gardening Workshop

Clean water in streams, inland lakes, and Lake Michigan depends largely on each of us and our landscaping and gardening practices to make a difference. Over 75 people attended a Landscaping and Gardening Workshop in New Troy, MI on March 3rd. The keynote speaker, Jason Fritz is a native plant and garden expert from the Cardno JFNew Native Plant Nursery; one of the largest native plant nurseries in the Midwest. Fritz discussed the benefits of native plants and how to plan, design, and maintain a natural landscape of any size.

Nancy Carpenter presented on what the Berrien County Conservation **District** can do for the community and homeowners. They offer a spring

tree sale and sell composting bins and rain barrels (any easy thing any homeowner with gutters can utilize) (www.berriencd.org). Kris Martin from SWMPC presented different methods of making compost and how to create a worm bin to produce healthy soil for gardening and landscaping. Marcy Colclough from SWMPC spoke about the new phosphorus ban on fertilizers for residential and commercial lawns and the affect that excessive phosphorus has on water quality in Michigan. Members from the River Valley Garden Club talked about their garden projects and how to get involved. Peg Kohring from The Conservation Fund and Terry Hanover from Friends of New Troy gave a tour of a rain garden planted with native plants that captures rain from the community center's roof top.

GRAHAM WOODHOUSE AWARD Connecting Communities and People

At the January 31, 2012 meeting SWMPC announced the selection of the <u>Connecting Communities and People: the Southwest Michigan Non-Motorized Transportation Plan and Map Project</u> as the 2012 Graham Woodhouse Intergovernmental Cooperation Award winner.

Chair Linda Preston and Executive Director John Egelhaaf presented award plaques to representatives of Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) Intermodal Policy Division and Southwest Region, Barry County, Berrien County, Branch County, Calhoun County, Cass County, Kalamazoo County, Van Buren County, Michigan Trails & Greenways Alliance, Kalamazoo Area Transportation Study, and SWMPC.

Allegan County, St. Joseph County and the Macatawa Area Coordinating Council were included in the award, but representatives were unable to attend.

According to the nomination submitted by Stepek, the goals of the project were to:

- 1. Update the existing Southwest Michigan Road and Trail Map created by the SWMPC in 2005;
- 2. Develop a comprehensive, regional, Non-Motorized Transportation Plan for MDOT's Southwest Region. Objectives of the planning document were to:
 - Provide a region-wide vision for a connected non-motorized system of off-road shared use paths and on-road facilities;
 - Encourage dialogue and more coordinated planning among state, county, and local entities;
 - Enhance partnerships and increase communication among state, county, and local agencies regarding the implementation.

In announcing the award, John Egelhaaf, SWMPC Executive Director said "The Graham Woodhouse Intergovernmental Effort Award recognizes cross-jurisdictional, regional cooperation as highly valued by the SWMPC. Such cooperation breeds the efficient use of limited resources, makes use of combined goalsetting, and speaks to the way most see the world; as nodes of regional resources. This award was established in 1987 to honor former Dowagiac Mayor Graham Woodhouse and is presented annually for projects that exemplify cooperation by local units of government. Recipients receive the Award in recognition of outstanding

cooperative effort in problem solving. The criteria used in evaluating project nominations include relative degree of effort by local units, methodology, scope, and project dimension.
