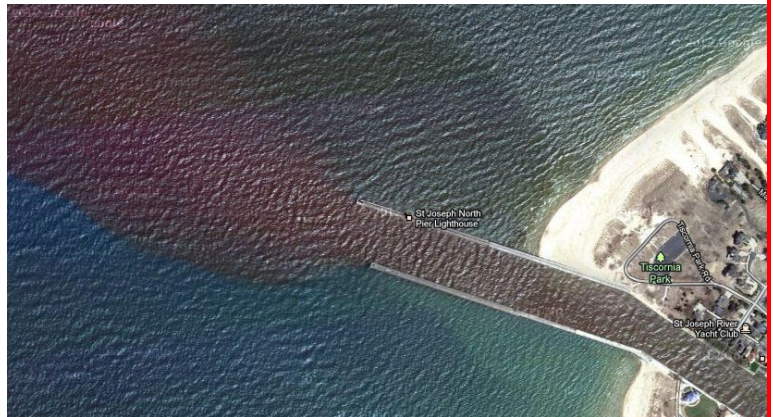
Who Will Benefit From This Training? All local government staff and elected officials.
